## PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

NOTE: As the 2002-2004 CSUS catalog is published, the Liberal Studies major is in the process of being revised to meet new multiple subject matter program standards adopted by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing in September, 2001. Consult the Liberal Studies program office to be sure you understand the program requirements that apply to you.
The Liberal Studies major is a multidisciplinary major designed for students who intend to become K-8 teachers in California. It is a California Commission on Teacher Credentialing-approved subject matter major, successful completion of which certifies an individual with "subject matter competence" required to enter a Multiple Subject Credential program. The largest portion of the major comprises the core section, with courses in language and literature, mathematics, natural science, social science and humanities, visual and performing arts, physical education, human development and foreign language. In addition, the major requires a concentration, which is a 12-unit area of focus where the student can develop knowledge in a discipline of special interest.
The Liberal Studies major is a complex program requiring early and continuing contact with an advisor. The core consists of 81-98 units; the concentration of 12 units; and university graduation requirements of 9-12 units. Specific unit totals depend on the possibility of overlapping requirements. The overall unit total of 93-110 units represents the preponderance of the units (120) required

[^0]to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree. Students are urged to obtain advice as early as possible to avoid delays in the completion of these requirements. The Liberal Studies program director and faculty and staff advisors are located in Lassen Hall 2008, (916) 278-6342. Early planning is also strongly advised to prepare students to apply to the professional education program. Details about multiple subject credential programs and regular information sessions are provided by the Teacher Preparation Program office in Eureka Hall 216, (916) 278-6403.
A Blended Elementary Teacher Education Program (BETEP) is offered jointly by Liberal Studies and the College of Education for students who have made a decision to become K-8 teachers as they enter university. This program, designed so that it can be completed in four and one-half years, blends together the coursework from the various subject matter areas in Liberal Studies with the education courses and student teaching of the credential program. Successful completion of all its requirements will culminate in a Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Studies and a preliminary (Level 1) Multiple Subject Credential. Plans are underway to develop a transfer blended program option with area community colleges. Students should consult the program director for detailed information and guidance on the blended program and the traditional program and which option to follow.

## CAREER POSSIBILITIES

The Liberal Studies major is specifically designed as a program of study in the multiple disciplines that wellprepared teachers in the kindergarten through middle school grades must have studied. Thus it is framed for students who intend to become teachers in K-8 schools and is not recommended as a general major for those who wish to pursue a variety of career fields other than teaching.

Summative Assessment Portfolio Requirement (0 units) In compliance with California Commission on Teacher Credentialing standards, in order to receive subject matter competency certification, students who complete the Liberal Studies major must submit an acceptable portfolio. The portfolio is primarily a compilation of samples of student work from each area of the curriculum and accompanying reflective essays. It is due in the program office the first week of the semester in which a student expects to graduate. LBST 105, Portfolio Development Seminar, is offered every semester. This one-unit, Credit/ No Credit course provides an opportunity for students to prepare their portfolios and is recommended to be taken in the semester before a student expects to graduate.
