Application for on-campus housing is free and easy, and admission to CSUS is not required to apply. Prospective CSUS students must contact the Housing and Residential Life office to request an on-campus housing application or visit the web site to apply online. Please note that application to CSUS is not an automatic application for on-campus housing.

Housing applications for fall/spring students may be submitted beginning the preceding October 1, and spring students can apply beginning the preceding August 1. On-campus housing applicants will automatically be sent a *Residence Hall and Dining Commons License Agreement and Information* booklet. Booklets are mailed in early May to fall/spring housing applicants and in early November for spring applicants. Space fills up quickly and priority is based on the date the License Agreement and payment are submitted.

On-campus living in the CSUS Residence Halls can have a great impact on student academic success and personal growth. Not only are the residence halls comfortable and convenient, but they also offer students ample opportunities to make new friends and be involved in floor, hall and campus-wide activities. Residence halls are staffed by live-in professionals and trained resident advisors who want to help students succeed. All of the staff are committed to providing the best possible living environment. They organize study sessions, social and educational activities, field trips, and serve as a source of campus information for residents. Living on campus can be a very special and rewarding part of the CSUS experience.

The residence hall community consists of five three-story residence halls: Sutter, Sierra, Draper, Jenkins, and Desmond with a central Dining Commons. Each hall provides living accommodations for 200-250 students with a lounge, study rooms, kitchen and laundry facilities. Psychological Counseling Services

Psychological Counseling Services (PCS) is a multipurpose counseling center that provides emotional and psychological support to university students. Licensed psychologists, MFT and MSW counselors and board certified psychiatrists provide clinical services to support students with their personal and academic goals. The PCS staff is committed to supporting the developmental needs of students.

Services offered to help students with new skill development, attitude enhancement or college adjustment include individual, group, and couples counseling and psychotherapy, psychiatric services, biofeedback training, workshops and lectures on developmental issues, and learning disorders testing and assessment. Our goal is to support the academic mission by helping students develop socially, emotionally, and intellectually.

All clinical services at PCS are confidential and your participation in the services can only be revealed with your permission. PCS uses a brief treatment model to provide services to as many students as possible. Typically students seek assistance to deal with relationship problems with significant others, anxiety, depression, stress, and adjustment to the university. Any emotional or psychological issue that interferes with academic functioning and quality of life can be explored at PCS. Individual, couples, and psychiatric care have specific time limits but group psychotherapy is available throughout your tenure at the university.

Counselors (psychologists, MFT or LCSW therapists) are available daily on a drop-in basis for assessment and follow-up. Regular ongoing counseling, psychiatric services, testing, or referral are

completed after drop-in assessment. In addition, brief consultation services concerning student issues are available to faculty and staff. (For ongoing faculty and staff concerns, please contact the campus Employee Assistance Program.)

PCS is a training site for new mental health professionals who are enrolled in doctoral programs at universities across the United States. The pre-doctoral interns provide clinical services under the direct supervision of licensed professionals. All staff at PCS are mental health professionals dedicated to improving the quality of campus life.

Services for Reentry Students

The Office of Reentry Services counsels adults, helping them explore academic options, determine career choices, and research acceleration opportunities. The experienced staff understands the

needs and concerns of reentry students and can help ease the transition to college life.

Reentry Services provides admission information for adult students in addition to coordinating a special admission program for adults 25 years of age and older who do not meet the standard admission requirements. Reentry Services administers a fee waiver program for applicants 60 years of age and older, reentry scholarships, and each semester hosts a special orientation for adult students.

Services to Students with Disabilities

The Office of Services to Students with Disabilities (SSWD) offers students with disabilities equal opportunity to participate in all programs, services, activities and facilities. SSWD also promotes campus awareness and education on disability issues.

The following disability categories may impede a student's educational process and necessitate support services: visual, communication, hearing and mobility impairments; specific learning disability; and other functional limitations and temporary disabilities.

Individually prescribed services linked to functional limitations may include assistance in the admission process, academic advising, limited priority registration and add/drop, disability management counseling, reading, note taking, interpreting, real time captioning, Braille textbooks, electronic text, limited golf cart shuttle, selective adaptive equipment, classroom test accommodations, advocacy, and referrals.

In order to ensure graduation, the "TRIO" Student Support Services Project offers retention services to students with disabilities who have academic support needs. It offers limited supplemental tutoring in various subjects including English and modified entry-level Math to eligible students.

The High Tech Center ensures equal access to computers through needs assessment and instruction in the use of adaptive computer hardware and software.

The Learning Disability Program refers students for diagnostic assessment of LD and ADD/HD to the Psychological Services Center.

To be eligible for services, a student must be currently enrolled at CSUS with documentation of disability on file at the SSWD office that demonstrates the need for accommodation and support services.

Student Resources

University Library

The University Library holds over one million volumes, thousands of maps, slides and pamphlets, and several million pieces of microforms and non-print media as well as subscriptions to some 4,000 magazines, technical and scholarly journals, and newspapers. Thousands of additional journals are available electronically. The Library is a depository for California State publications and for selected United States government materials.

EUREKA (the Library catalog) and other databases, available on all floors, are also searchable from remote locations via the Internet.

Library Media Services, located on the first floor, provides individual listening and viewing facilities for media collections; the Library's slide and microform collections can also be found there, complete with reading and printing capabilities. The second floor houses the **reference collection** and service points, as well as the **Curriculum Collection** that contains materials related to elementary and secondary school instruction. **Periodicals** are located on the third floor.

The Department of Special Collections and University Archives collects materials from California State University, Sacramento as well as items documenting the social, cultural, economic and political history of the Sacramento region. High-use materials are kept on reserve or offered electronically in the Reserve Book Room located across from the Library entry. Other special Library facilities and services include a map area, group study rooms, a Graduate Studies Reading Area, and a computer lab for student use. Self-service copiers and Print Smart stations are available on each floor. The **Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection** is an extensive collection of books, journals, pamphlets, nonbook materials, rare books and manuscript materials as well as art and artifacts related to all aspects of Greek, Byzantine, and Ottoman history and culture. It was initiated with a 70,000 volume collection gifted to CSUS by developer and philanthropist, Angelo Tsakopoulos, in 2002.

Orientation tours are conducted at regular intervals during the initial weeks of each semester. The reference librarians also offer subject-oriented sessions and other forms of library instruction.

Hands-on sessions on database searching and searching the Internet, and an array of subject-based classes are scheduled in the **Library Instruction Labs.**

Items not owned by the Library can be obtained through an interlibrary loan and document delivery service, usually provided without fee to students, faculty and staff.

Consult the Library homepage for additional information about Library collections and services, hours, staff, maps, exhibits, instructional opportunities and information competence, subject guides, and other materials. This homepage also provides access to EUREKA (the CSUS catalog), electronic journals and other databases.

Career Center

The Career Center utilizes a variety of programs and services to assist students in identifying and obtaining their educational and career objectives.

The Career Center provides walk-in career counseling assistance to students. If more assistance is needed, students then schedule individual appointments.

During individual appointments with a career counselor, students identify values, personality traits, skills, and interests that influence their decisions about choices and changes of majors, minors, and work. Students explore fields and occupations of interest using the Career Resource Library, computer databases, and the Internet. Individualized action plans enhance informational interviews, internships, volunteerism, and part-time employment.

Exploration through experience is an important aspect of making viable academic, work, and life decisions. The Experiential Learning Program provides students with part-time, volunteer, community service, internship, and seasonal job opportunities. Students have access to job information 24 hours a day, seven days a week with an Internet job listing service through MonsterTrak.com (www.monstertrak.com). The Career Center in-house job-listing database, J.O.B. Board, is available during office hours. The J.O.B. Board includes local and regional full-time, part-time, and internship listings in business, government, nonprofit, and education.

Coordinated by the Recruitment Program, more than 800 local and regional employers in business, education, and government conduct on-campus interviews with graduating students throughout the academic year. Students preparing their job searches benefit from workshops on job search, resume, and interview techniques; orientation to the On-Campus Recruitment process; company literature, videos, and information meetings; and Career Fairs in Fall and Spring.

The Career Center welcomes students and alumni* Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Writing Center

The Writing Center is a place for all CSUS students to get help with writing for any course or project. Trained undergraduate and graduate student tutors offer support at any stage of the writing process, including helping writers to identify a focus for a paper, working on development of ideas, refining organization, citing sources, or clarifying language. The Writing Center emphasizes nonjudgmental and encouraging feedback to help a student not only with a particular assignment but also with becoming a more confident college writer.

If a student is working on a writing assignment in any undergraduate major, in a writing course, or in a graduate course, it is appropriate to come to the Writing Center. Tutors are experienced in working with the diverse population of CSUS students including multilingual and multi-dialectal writers. Along with guidance on writing assignments, the Writing Center also provides tutorials for students who are preparing to take the WPE or other writing tests and for graduate students working on thesis projects.

Appointments can be made in person, beginning the second week of classes each semester. Students interested in becoming a Writing Center tutor should contact the director, Professor Cherryl Smith, at *smithc@csus.edu*.

Computing, Communications, and Media Services (CCMS)

Computing, Communications and Media Services (CCMS) comprises four interrelated departments supporting an extensive array of computing, communications, and media applications, tools, support systems and distance education services.

University Computing and Communications Services (UCCS) Sequoia Hall 319 (916) 278-6606

University Computing and Communications Services (UCCS) is responsible for all university-wide computing and data communications equipment, software, and networking. UCCS operates major computer systems accessible to CSUS students, faculty and administrative staff. Located on the third floor of Sequoia Hall is an IBM 9672CMOSCPU, multiple Hewlett Packard server platforms, and many Pentium class platforms. The UCCS computer room serves as (1) a center for mainframe services and other activities; (2) a host environment for a wide variety of general and highly specialized servers; and (3) the network operations center. The National Science Foundation supercomputer in San Diego is also available to CSUS faculty and students for instructional and research purposes. In addition, there are more than 4,000 user workstations located throughout the campus for students and faculty.

Virtually all campus computers are tied together into local and wide area networks by a campus wide high-speed fiber optic based backbone. These networks support instruction, research and administrative functionality and provide connectivity to workstations located in campus instructional laboratories, many classrooms, faculty and administrative offices. The UCCS backbone network is linked to the Internet via a high-capacity fiber optics path to 4CNet (a service of the CSU), connecting the University to all major educational and research sites in the world. Internet connectivity allows UCCS to offer a host of services beyond the scope of the campus. Some of these services include: electronic mail delivery, distributed availability of data and programs via interconnected file servers, UseNet news feeds (a worldwide electronic bulletin board and information service), remote file access to distant sites (including massive archives of Macintosh and PC-compatible freeware and shareware), World Wide Web (www) access, video/audio streaming, and compressed video and audio communications.

Most University computing laboratories for students are open from early morning through late evening, including weekends, with one lab available 18 hours per day with additional hours during the last part of the semester. Major instructional computing laboratories are staffed with lab supervisors to assist students and faculty. Various types of microcomputer workstations, sophisticated graphics displays, and graphics printers are available for student and faculty use. Students are encouraged to establish a UCCS SacLink account to provide them with e-mail service, access to University information resources and the Internet. In addition, a dedicated data communications dial-up network is maintained by the University to provide students and faculty with off-campus access to University computing and information resources.

Administrative computing systems provide a wide range of online services for students to apply, register for classes, obtain their grades, and change their name/address electronically on campus or remotely through an Internet accessible system called CasperWeb. Two other systems, i.e., CASPER and Casper.NET, provide the ability to register for classes and obtain grades through a touch-tone telephone system

A Faculty/Staff Resource and Training Center and an extensive microcomputer software library are available to faculty and staff for evaluation and training purposes. A staff consultant is available in the Resources and Training Center, Monday through Friday. Online training materials are available to students, faculty, and staff eager to increase their computer literacy and information competency. Among the academic duties, UCCS staff supports web page development and web-based courseware training and empowerment.

University Distance and Distributed Education (DDE) Sequoia Hall 319 (916) 278-7948

The office of Distance and Distributed Education (DDE) supports academic programs in the scheduling, marketing, and development of matriculated courses through synchronous and asynchronous delivery systems such as televised instruction, audio and video conferencing, CD-ROM, and over the Internet. DDE takes full advantage of CCMS' three other departments as the means by which CSUS courses and programs can be extended regionally through technology. This unit also carries out assessment and assists faculty in adapting their curriculum to electronic delivery.

University Media Services (UMS) University Library 15 (916) 278-6862

University Media Services (UMS) provides a wealth of media production, instructional design, and creative services, distance education opportunities, multimedia, and classroom audiovisual resources. Its primary purpose is to support and complement the needs of faculty and students in the teaching/learning process. Highly specialized staff with skills in instructional design assist faculty in modifying traditional courseware for delivery via televised instruction, CD-ROM, and web course development. UMS also offer a variety of training opportunities from simple equipment operation to multimedia software development and production.

UMS facilities include two television production centers (one dedicated to the Department of Communication Studies for training students), video post-production editing systems, four studio classrooms, satellite and video compression conferencing services, audio bridging services, and a closed circuit television network linking more than 400 classrooms and laboratories. Ninety sites are connected to the Internet and equipped for computer and video presentations. The UMS video-conferencing network is capable of supporting 8 sites simultaneously. Satellite capability represents Ku and C-band technologies, up and downlinking in both analog and digital formats. The department also manages and maintains a mobile satellite uplink.

Students enrolled at CSUS may take advantage of a variety of media hardware and equipment resources available from the UMS Classroom Services department located in the lower level of the Library South Wing, Room 12. Traditional audiovisual equipment is available for checkout to students Monday through Friday during normal business hours. In addition, UMS provides a student/ faculty work area supporting high-speed audio duplication, videotape editing and duplication, and photographic slide production.

*University Telecommunications Services (UTS)*Seqouia Hall 312 (916) 278-6664

University Telecommunications Services (UTS) is responsible for the campus internal telephone system, voice mail; communications infrastructure; installation, repair and maintenance; operator services; directory services; and telecommunications call accounting and cost recovery. In cooperation with Residential Life, UTS and UCCS provide voice, voice mail, data communications, instructional and entertainment video services to students living in the dorms.

Veterans' Affairs

The Veterans' Affairs office assists veterans, reservists, and dependents of service disabled or deceased veterans filing to use their educational benefits. The staff provides information on completing VA claim forms for federal and state education assistance programs. They also assist with registration procedures required for students who are sponsored under one of the Cal-Vet Fee Waiver programs (for dependents and disabled veterans), help identify and resolve benefit payment problems, and facilitate loans to qualified students under special circumstances.

VA work-study jobs are available to dependents and veterans currently receiving VA educational benefits. Visitors to the Veterans' Affairs Office should check in at the Admissions and Records Customer Service Counter, 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. and 2:00 - 4:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

Women's Resource Center

The Women's Resource Center (WRC) promotes gender equity through education, advocacy, and social action. In collaboration with other campus organizations and university programs, the Center develops programs designed to increase the awareness and understanding of the contributions, opportunities and barriers facing women in our society. The WRC also houses a circulating library relating to women's issues and maintains up-todate listings of campus and community resources relative to women's concerns. Another component of the WRC is the Violence and Sexual Assault Support Services, developed to offer advocacy and support services to victim/survivors of sexual assault and relationship violence and to coordinate referrals to other campus and community programs. The WRC also offers educational programs designed to increase awareness of the impact of sexual assault and relationship violence, and to offer risk reduction information to the campus community. The services and programs of WRC are available to all CSUS students, faculty, and staff.

Associated Students, Inc. (ASI), a \$9.2 million nonprofit corporation, serves as student government at CSUS. Programs created and operated by ASI benefit the whole campus community.

A student Board of Directors, including the President, Executive Vice President, Vice President of Finance, Vice President of University Affairs, and Directors representing each college on campus, governs ASI. Elected each spring, this Board meets regularly through the Fall and Spring semesters. Students are encouraged to attend Board meetings, bringing their questions and concerns; however, peer representatives remain available at all times to address the needs and interests of their constituency.

With more than 30 committees and work teams, ASI offers students an assortment of ways to get involved in campus life. Participation provides students valuable experience and important future career contacts. ASI services to CSUS students range from free legal aid to discount movie tickets. Programs include the Children's Center, the Aquatic Center, Peak Adventures, KSSU, the Learning Resource Center at Florin Mall, and Safe Rides.

ASI also maintains the Student Access Center (SAC). Located on the main floor of the University Union, SAC is a great place to get information about a wide range of topics such as housing, employment and university services.

Through grants and contracts, ASI contributes financial support to athletics and various other University programs. ASI's contract with Regional Transit allows students to ride RT buses free with a current, validated CSUS ID card.

Aquatic Center

The CSUS Aquatic Center has recently undergone major improvements of its facilities. Some highlights are new classrooms and an administration building; men's and women's showers and locker rooms; new 7,500 sq/ft rowing boathouse and canoe/kayak boathouse; a weight room; barbecues; and additional parking.

The CSUS Aquatic Center provides high quality boating instruction and safety programs through education, recreation, and competition.

The Center, established in 1981, is a cooperative operation of the CSUS Associated Students, Inc., the University Union, California Department of Boating and Waterways, California Department of Parks and Recreation, and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. The Center offers a variety of programs. These include classes for academic credit, leisure adult classes open to the general public, competitive rowing, water ski and sailing teams, youth summer programs and camps, facility and room rentals, team building exercises, and special event facilitation.

The Center was established to augment the academic curriculum at CSUS. It is open to students, faculty, staff, alumni of CSUS, and the general public. All students, faculty, staff, and alumni of CSUS receive a discount on boat rentals and leisure classes by showing their CSUS identification card.

The Aquatic Center is located on Lake Natoma, next to Nimbus Dam at Highway 50 and Hazel Avenue. On the grounds are picnic tables, barbecues, boat docks, and beach front lake access.

The center houses an abundance of aquatic equipment: rowing shells and wherries, sailboats, kayaks, paddles, canoes, windsurfing items, jet skis, competition wakeboard and water ski boats.

The Center is home to the CSUS Women's Intercollegiate Rowing Team, the CSUS Men's Rowing Club, Capital Crew High School Rowing, LNRC (Lake Natoma Rowing Club), the CSUS Water Ski/Wakeboard Team/Club, and the CSUS Sailing Club, and the CSUS Paddling Club. The Center annually hosts an array of regional and national rowing regattas, water ski tournaments, and special events attracting local, national, and international athletes. The Aquatic Center has developed into a benchmark aquatic facility.

Intercollegiate Athletics

CSUS is committed to providing equal opportunities to men and women students in intercollegiate athletics. Approximately 450 students participate in the athletics program with athletic scholarships awarded to student-athletes in every sport.

Hornet Stadium provides both the Fred Anderson Field for football and a superior track and field facility that was selected to host the U.S. Olympic Track & Field Trials in 2000 and 2004. Hornet Gymnasium, newly renovated, seats approximately 1,000 spectators for women's volleyball, men's and women's basketball and women's gymnastics. The women's rowing team trains and competes at the CSUS Aquatic Center on Lake Natoma, one of the top aquatics facilities in the country.

Student athletes benefit from quality training and conditioning facilities with three full-time athletic trainers consulting and treating athletes daily. CSUS is home of one the few accredited undergraduate athletic training programs in Northern California. Two full-time weight-training coaches provide excellent strength and conditioning programs for all athletes.

CSUS competes in the National Collegiate Athletic Association's (NCAA) Division I and is a member of the Big Sky Conference in football (IAA), women's volleyball, basketball, women's soccer, cross country, indoor track, outdoor track and field, tennis, and golf. The University's softball team competes in the newly formed Pacific Coast Softball Conference, while baseball competes as an independent. Men's soccer and women's gymnastics teams are members of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation and women's rowing competes in the Western Independent Rowing Association.

Students interested in competing in an intercollegiate sport may contact the Department for a referral to the appropriate head coach. While many athletes are recruited to the University prior to their enrollment, a number of the sport programs offer tryout opportunities for walk-in students.
