Program Description

A knowledge of Russian has grown in importance in the years following the breakup of the Soviet Union, and the Russian language program prepares students to be first-hand observers as the new Russia moves into the 21st century.

The Russian language program has two phases. Phase I, RUSS 001A through RUSS 002B, is designed to provide an intermediate, practical command of spoken and written Russian and to introduce the most obvious differences between the Russian and U.S. culture. Upon completion of RUSS 002B, students are able to converse at an elementary to intermediate level and to read Russian language newspapers, magazines and simple short stories with the aid of a dictionary.

Phase II of the Russian language program, at least six upper division units, is designed to provide advanced speaking, writing, reading, translating and grammar practice for Russian minors.

Special Features

• The Sacramento State Office of International Programs administers a one-to-one student exchange with Moscow Linguistics University (MLU). Sacramento State students may apply for a semester or year program at MLU. Credits earned at MLU may be applied either to the Sacramento State Russian minor or, in certain instances, to special majors. Students must successfully complete at least one year of college level Russian language study before applying for the exchange.

Requirements • Minor

Units required for the Minor: 12, of which at least 6 must be upper division units in Russian. Courses must be approved by a Foreign Language advisor. Transfer students must complete at least one three-unit upper division Russian course at Sacramento State.

Note: Students who intend to take the National Security Agency Russian Language Test as part of their application for employment upon completion of their baccalaureate degree are advised to successfully complete a minimum of 24 semester units of Russian language study. Literature-in-translation courses do not count as part of the minimum, nor do they count as upper division course work credited toward the minor.

Lower Division Courses

RUSS 001A. Elementary Russian. Russian language beginning course with primary emphasis on the development of communication skills. Russian life and culture are introduced through readings and video/films. 5 units. (CAN RUSS 002)

RUSS 001B. Elementary Russian. Continuation of RUSS 001A. Continued emphasis on communication skills and continued integration of cultural-historical components with the language learning experience. **Prerequisite:** RUSS 001A or instructor permission. 5 units. (CAN RUSS 004)

RUSS 002A. Intermediate Russian. Continuation of RUSS 001 with further emphasis on the development of communication skills. Meets the Foreign Language Graduation Proficiency Requirement. **Prerequisite:** RUSS 001B or instructor permission. Fall only. 4 units.

RUSS 002B. Intermediate Russian. Continuation of RUSS 002A. Meets the Foreign Language Graduation Proficiency Requirement. **Prerequisite:** RUSS 002A or instructor permission. Spring only. 4 units.

Upper Division Courses

RUSS 105. Advanced Russian Language Practice. Small group instruction for upper division students desiring to improve their skills in mastering the language. Content and emphasis changes every semester. May be taken for credit three times. 3 units.

RUSS 120. Russian Civilization. Introduction to the cultural context that has accompanied Russia's political history from the earliest days of the Kievan state to current post-Communist Russia. Through reading Russian poems and short stories, interviewing Russians, and viewing Russian films, the student will begin to view Russia as Russians see it; thus, the overall objective is to introduce students to the richness of Russia's civilization through her people's own words and images. 3 units.

RUSS 194. Field Experience/Internship. Directed fieldwork in a project which uses the language skills developed through previous study of Russian. The projects may include interpreting and translating for public and/or private agencies in Sacramento, teaching or tutoring Russian immigrants, or other projects approved by the faculty supervisor. All work will be monitored by Sacramento State faculty. The student must submit written reports to his/her supervisor. May be taken for credit more than once. Prerequisite: Intermediate competency in Russian and instructor permission. Graded Credit/No Credit. 1-3 units.

RUSS 195. Fieldwork — Tutoring. Tutoring of lower division students of Russian, under supervision of instructor. Three hours of tutoring per week for each unit. May be taken for credit more than once. **Prerequisite:** Intermediate competency in Russian and permission of supervising instructor. Graded Credit/No Credit. 1-3 units.

RUSS 199. Special Problems. Individual projects or directed reading. **Note:** Open only to students who are competent to carry on independent study. Admission requires the approval of the instructor by whom the work is to be supervised. 1-3 units.
