

GENERAL EDUCATION

The General Education Program is vital to the overall mission of California State University, Sacramento. The broad range of subject matter and skills encompassed by the program will help prepare CSUS graduates to live internally rewarding lives while serving others. The General Education program is designed to provide knowledge, skills, experiences and perspectives which will enable students to make connections among disciplines; expand their capacity to take part in a wide range of human interests and activities; and confront personal, moral and social problems that life in society inevitably presents to each of us.

Objectives

Upon completion of General Education program requirements, students should have the ability to:

- read, write and understand relatively complex and sophisticated English prose,
- construct a non-fallacious verbal argument, recognize fallacious arguments and follow the verbal arguments of others,
- find and use common references in libraries, engage in specialized library research, use computers and seek out appropriate expert opinion and advice, and
- use mathematical ideas to accomplish a variety of tasks where their use is essential or helpful.

In addition to these basic skills, courses in the sciences, arts, humanities and social sciences have been carefully selected to help students understand:

 current theory and knowledge about the physical universe; a firsthand acquaintance with the methods of science, including a general understanding of the role of hypothesis formation and theory testing; and the enhancement of conceptual problem solving skills in the sciences,

- current theory and knowledge concerning the origins and varieties of life on this planet, the basic principles of life processes, the interdependence of living creatures in ecological systems, and the effects on life of changes in the environment,
- the historical and cultural influences that have played a role in the evolution of values, principles, beliefs and ideals commonly encountered in Western and non-Western cultures through a study of significant literary, philosophical and artistic works,
- the role of major social institutions which affect our lives and the role individuals and groups play in shaping those institutions, which includes the study of the theory and methods of the social sciences,
- the perspectives and contributions to human activities and experiences of people from diverse cultures and backgrounds, including the contributions and perspectives of non-Western cultures, and of women, ethnic and other underrepresented groups who have been the objects of prejudice and adverse discrimination within our society, and
- currently held views and methods for expanding our knowledge of the processes of mental and physical development through the human life cycle.

Courses selected and approved by the faculty for the General Education program are designed to meet these objectives. Students are encouraged to consult an academic advisor in their major department or the Academic Advising Center in planning their G.E. program. General Education courses offered are listed each semester in the center pages of the Schedule of Classes.

Course Requirements

Students must complete 51 units of General Education
Breadth requirements. In addition, a second semester composition course and demonstration of proficiency in a foreign language are required for graduation. (See page 88 for a description of these two requirements.) The units must be selected from the following Area requirements:



GE POLICIES

- All upper division courses require at least second semester sophomore standing and completion of all Area A required courses as prerequisites,
- At least nine units must be in upper division courses (100-199) and at least nine units must be taken in residence at CSUS. (These units may overlap.) Three of these units may be an

- Advanced Studies course if your major requires that this requirement be met in General Education (check with your major department),
- No upper division units used to meet General Education requirements may be credited toward a major, and no more than three units used to satisfy General Education requirements may be credited toward a minor,
- No upper division major course and no more than six lower division units from a student's major field may be used to meet General Education requirements,
- Each course taken to satisfy the Area A Basic Subjects and Area **B4** Quantitative Reasoning must be completed with a grade of C- or higher. A 2.0 GPA must be achieved upon completion of all General Education requirements.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

Transfer students who have completed lower division General Education requirements at a California community college, including those certified under Intersegmental General Education Transfer Core Curriculum (IGETC), are required to complete a minimum of 9 units of upper division G.E. at CSUS and to meet the foreign language proficiency graduation requirement. The 9 units upper division may or may not include the Advanced Studies requirement, depending on the policy of the student's major department. Students who have not completed an approved course for the "Race and Ethnicity in American Society" category at a community college must take a course in this category at CSUS. In addition, all transfer students, except those fully certified as having completed the IGETC core curriculum, must complete the required sophomore level writing course or an approved course at a community college.
