PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Canadian Studies is an interdisciplinary certificate program designed to improve understanding of Canada and U.S.-Canadian relations. The program prepares candidates for opportunities in Canadian Studies graduate programs and offers an area studies perspective on Canada to students in all disciplines. It may be especially useful for students who anticipate careers related to international business and international affairs.

Upon completion of the program, a candidate may petition the Dean of the School of Arts and Letters for issuance of the Certificate in Canadian Studies at the time of graduation. A person already holding a bachelor's degree can be awarded the Certificate upon completion of the required number of units.

The Canadian Studies faculty and certificate candidates will meet periodically to discuss items pertinent to the study of Canada and U.S.-Canadian relations. In addition, special lectures, symposia, and conferences related to Canadian Studies will be sponsored by the program. The University Library has been designated as a Selective Depository for Canadian Government Publications.

The CSU International Program in Quebec province provides CSUS students with the opportunity to get acquainted with French Canadian culture and French language through a summer language program and enrollment at a Quebec university during the academic year.
